## BAPU'S BUSINESS

The month of October presents an array of festivities, celebrations and commemorations all across the globe. In India, on a secular front, we begin the month with the celebration of Bapu's birth anniversary - Gandhi Jayanti. Bapu's strategy of non-violence to attain independence stands as an inspiration for the world to drop the weapons and take up the peaceful means of even-handed justice and fair treatment to all. Bapu believed in the power of love and non-violence.

We conclude the month with the celebration of National Unity Day which pays tribute to the veteran freedom fighter Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel. We need to be grateful to him for his decisive efforts in bringing about integration of India. The celebration of National Unity Day provides us with an opportunity to reaffirm the inherent strength and resilience of our nation to withstand the threats to the unity and integrity of our nation. These two major events of the past are fused together by the current major event of Bharath Jodo Yatra organized by Congress with the objective to unite India; to come together and strengthen the nation.

All these three major events, even though proclaim the importance of unity of the nation, we are aware that India continues to struggle for true freedom, real peace and tangible unity envisaged by Bapu because citizens remain divided by walls of communal, religious or linguistic prejudices and these barriers weaken and distract the national will for freedom, peace and unity. But, we can go recourse to the wise counsels of the Father of the Nation, Mahatma Gandhi, who was deeply imbued by the teachings of Jesus specially the Sermon on the Mount. He has something valuable to tell us at this time in history. Thomas Merton concludes his Foreword to 'Gandhi on Non Violence' as follows, "Gandhi's principles are extremely pertinent today ... especially for those interested in implementing the principles expressed by Pope John XXIII, in Pacem in Terris. Indeed this Encyclical has the breadth and depth, the universality and tolerance of Gandhi's peace-minded outlook. Peace cannot be built on exclusivism, absolutism and intolerance; neither can it be built on vague liberal slogans and pious programs gestated in the smoke of confabulation. There can be no peace on earth without the inner change that brings man to his "right mind"."

Mahatma Gandhi made it his vision to reconcile differences and bring about harmony in place of conflict and he relentlessly worked for heart-unity, for without such unity he felt that self-governance, even if it is achieved, could not be genuine. Bapu used to say, his mission was not merely freedom of India but through realization of freedom of India, he hoped to realize the mission of brotherhood of humans. He believed that patriotism was not an exclusive thing, it was all-embracing and one should reject that patriotism which sought to mount distress or exploitation upon others. His concept of patriotism and religion were consistent with the vision of good of all humanity and embrace of all forms of life. He

wanted to realize brotherhood or identity not merely with the human beings but wanted to realize identity with all life because all beings claim common descent from the same God, and that being so, all life in all forms must be essentially one.

The importance of India as a nation lies in its unity. Unity is India's strength and unity in diversity is the most important feature of India. Therefore, national integration alone can be the foundation of a resilient and flourishing India. As we march ahead with Bapu's business of actualizing his vision of united and integrated India, it is important for us to acknowledge that there is a need for commitment to the nation as a whole. We have to form strong and long-lasting associations with every being and every form of life to create unity and brotherhood through non-violent means to avoid catastrophic consequences.

Bapu's business of establishing a tolerant, inclusive, united and progressive nation stems from his vision of the reign of God and brotherhood of all, and therefore, as we journey through the month dedicated to Mother Mary, let us earnestly entreat her, through the recitation of the rosary, to intercede for us so that we may understand our duty towards one another and our nation. We also pray that the reign of God becomes a reality in our nation and in the world believing that God is persevering in his business of ushering in his reign through the transformation of our social, political, cultural, economic and spiritual order. Our prayer for the realization of the reign of God is also a means for us to submit ourselves afresh to God and allow him to use us in his divine business. As we celebrate this month as the missionary month, let us make it our mission to commit ourselves to live for the business of God entrusted to each one of us at this time in history and make our wholehearted contribution for the good of our nation and the world as we humbly admit, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done our duty." (Luke 17:10).

# STOP CHILD BEGGARY, STOP CHILD LABOUR SSS, PUNE

'Do not give money to begging children; do not buy materials sold by children. Give to needy children what they need, not money. By giving money to a begging child you make the child a beggar for life'. Sarva Seva Sangh, Pune, which had begun its campaign against child beggary and child labour from the year 2020 conducted awareness programme on child beggary in two schools in September 2022 to sensitize the students to this issue.



The awareness programme was conducted at Holy Spirit School, Lonikand on 14<sup>th</sup> September and in St. Clare's School, Nana Peth on 15<sup>th</sup> September. The students in Kindergarten and Primary section were made to understand the ill effects of child beggary and child labour through short interactive sessions while the students in higher section were sensitized with the help of banners and posters. The students were also given handbills containing

awareness messages on child beggary and child labour to be given to their parents to sensitize the family as well. The young students were made to understand that when a child is hungry the mother gives food to the child, not money. Children who are made to beg or sell materials on the streets lose their right to education and many children misuse money to purchase harmful materials and get addicted at their tender age. Sarva Seva Sangh also conducted a survey of begging children in Pune city during July and August 2022 and the report was submitted to the District Women and Child Development Officer, Child Welfare Committee and to the Special Juvenile Police Squad. Public awareness is being created in the city through 50 auto rickshaws by displaying posters.

#### **NEWS FROM INM MISSION OFFICE**



INM Mission Secretary, Fr. Jolly visited Mysore and Mangalore SVD communities from 3<sup>rd</sup> September to 10<sup>th</sup> September 2022. During the visits he did mission animation for the seminarians in Vidya Niketan, Mysore and SVD House, Kirem. He met the communities and shared SVD mission experiences with them. During the visit he also encouraged the confreres and motivated the communities to form SVD Lay Mission Partner groups in their localities. He is hopeful that one each Lay Mission Partner group will be formed in Mysore and Mangalore soon.

Earlier, Fr. Jolly along with Fr. Ronald D'Silva had visited the Pune in order to undertake the project of video interviewing our confreres.

The project is titled as 'Living the Word in the World'. We interviewed all the confreres in Pune recording their vocation stories and their mission stories as they are living the Word in the world. Fr. Jolly also addressed the seminarians in DWS and celebrated Mass with the community.

### FINANCE MANAGEMENT & LEGAL COMPLIANCE WORKSHOP



Five confreres from our province – Frs. George Crasta, P. David, Lucas Parkhe, Jose George and Melroy Mascarenhas attended a 3 day workshop on 'Finance Management & Legal Compliance for NGOs' at Karl Kübel Institute for Development Education (KKID), Coimbatore from 13<sup>th</sup> to 15<sup>th</sup> September 2022. The resource person Vittal Rao Lokare, an Associate Member of the "Institute of Chartered Accountants of India", practising in Bangalore has been extending his services as an auditor to many corporate as well as NGOs covered under Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act 2010 for more than 25 years. He introduced to the participants in a span of three days the legal framework of NGOs, principles of accounting, financial management, basics of book-keeping, journal management, systems for internal control and accountability, project budgeting and

budgeting control, financial documentation and reporting, methods of financial reporting to donors, legal compliance with FCRA and home ministry, taxation on GST and NGOs; and Dos and don'ts in NGO finance management in a systematic manner with simple examples. This training provided our confreres with an understanding of common practices in finance management, basic systems and practices that is necessary for a healthy organisation.

# TEEN SUICIDE-FREE MUMBAI A SNEHAANGAN-ATMADARSHAN COLLABORATION

# LEADERSHIP AND JUBILARIANS COURSES ISHVANI KENDRA, PUNE



The months of August and September were a busy time for Ishvani Kendra with two back to back courses. The first was Leadership for Mission meant for the Superiors. Two religious brothers and 18 religious sisters belonging to eight congregations participated in the three-week course. Most of them were appointed to leadership roles for the first time. Hence the aim of the course was to enable the leaders to mould themselves to be prophetic, credible and

compassionate persons to lead their communities on the path of the mission entrusted by Jesus. Therefore, it included modules that dealt with psychological, biblical and theological aspects of leadership, community building, the leadership of women, financial management, lessons from Indian religious traditions and corporate world. Each one also prepared a personal action plan to lead their communities and ministries in the light of the mission of Jesus. The participants expressed their satisfaction and happiness for the grace and empowerment they experienced throughout the three weeks from July 31-20 August.

This was immediately followed by the four-week Silver Jubilarians' Special: Renewal in Religious Missionary Life from August 28 - 24 September 2022. This renewal course was aimed at enabling the participants to refresh and rejuvenate and update themselves to continue their missionary journey with greater enthusiasm and zeal. Hence, they reflected on topics like the midlife transition, spirituality for deeper commitment, Mary as the model, challenges and opportunities for religious today, biblical missionary discipleship, significance of jubilee for mission etc. The course climaxed with a retreat

titled Deep Calls to Deep. There were exactly 25 participants belonging to six congregations. They felt very much at home, as is always the case at Ishvani Kendra and immensely benefitted from the course modules. It was indeed a time of grace. Their joyful and smiling faces said it all as they expressed their gratefulness on the last day before going back to their communities with their spirits high.

### **SUB-ZONAL MEETINGS**

The India Sub-zone Formation Board meeting took place at Shanti Bhavan, Jharsuguda, on 16-17 September 2022. The meeting started with the Morning Prayer at 6.30 am on 16<sup>th</sup> September followed by the inaugural Eucharist presided over by the Chairperson of Formation Board, Fr. Richard Mathias. The Provincial Superiors of INC, INE and INH and the Regional Superior of ING along with the Formation



Secretary joined in as concelebrants. The formal beginning of the meeting was marked by a prayer at 8.45 am which started with the enthronement of the Word of God. The welcome address of the chairperson followed it.

The morning session of the opening day was dedicated to an ongoing formation input session. Sr. Flora F.C. was the resource person who enlightened the participants on the topic "Assessment

of Candidates for Religious Life and Priesthood". The afternoon sessions got underway at 3 pm with the presentation of the report by the Formation Secretary. Thereafter, the floor decided to take up for discussion the suggestions received from various formation communities and other sources. The rest of the time of the meeting was devoted to the discussion of the agenda items. After discussions spread over several sessions, the meeting concluded with the sharing of the observers such as the Superior Delegate, Fr. Scaria Pannackal, and the SSpS representative Sr. Wilma Noronha, (Provincial Leader of India East and Chairperson of the SSpS Formation Board). Later the Chairperson of the Formation Board announced that the next meeting will take place on the 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> of September 2023 in INH Province. The meeting concluded with the vote of thanks proposed by the Secretary of the Formation Board.

The Inter Provincial Forum (IPF) meeting commenced with inaugural Holy Eucharist presided over by Fr. Maxim Rodrigues SVD, Chairman of the Inter Provincial Forum, and concelebrated by all the PRM Superiors and Mission Secretary of India Sub-Zone. The official inauguration of the IPF meeting was done by ceremonial lighting up of the lamp by all the PRM Superiors and Sr. Vilma Noronha SSpS, Provincial Leader of INE Province. Fr. Jerome Sequeira SJ was the resource person for the day and he gave input session on the theme: 'Missionary Response to the present Socio-Political Scenario in India'. During the second session a four-page text was distributed for personal reflection and four questions for sharing in four groups. The third session was conducted by Fr. Donald D'Souza SVD, INM Provincial Treasurer and Convener of PRM Treasurers of India Sub-Zone on the theme, "Finance: an integral part of our Mission". He presented the four pillars (Accounting Records, Financial Planning, Financial Monitoring and Internal Controls) of financial management and exhorted the assembly the seriousness of book-keeping, documentation, planning, accountability and transparency. In the fourth session the Area Coordinators and Secretaries of Sub-Zone presented their annual implementation reports highlighting the main activities done and also presented the action plan for the next year.

The second day of the meeting began with morning Eucharistic celebration celebrated by Fr. Ananda Raju Nagothu SVD, Vice-Provincial Superior of INH. In the first session of the second day Fr. Maria Michael SVD presented the findings of the 'IPF Evaluation' which was done during the year 2019-2020. In the subsequent sessions, deliberations on the agenda points and the discussions were held. Fr. Jeevan Kenndy, SVD Vice-Regional Superior of ING proposed vote of thanks to all and IPF meeting came to an end with final blessing from the Chairperson.

#### ELECTION FOR THE INM LEADERSHIP TEAM

SVD India Sub-zone Governing Body in its meeting held on 26 February 2022 at SVD Vidya Bhavan, Bhopal had discussed and decided on having synchronized election process in the Sub-zone, and accordingly, the dates for the Provincial/Regional Leadership Team elections were finalized.
